Time and everything else are running out for the Empire. In fact, it's already running on fumes. Before the last grain of sand falls from its hourglass, each person will have hard choice to make. Some will shut their eyes to the inevitable. Others will choose to reject catastrophe. But even if they're doomed, there's no point in going down quietly. Beneath her mask of patriotism, Tanya vows to do whatever it takes to avoid going down with the ship. The Saga of the Companies is a very timely book. It deals with the history, sociology and economics of a community of Companies which, if not recorded, will not become history, but remain as legend. Many a son and daughter, descendants of the early Company settlers, have migrated and new elements have been introduced into these places. Today the Company districts are not what they were in the 1930s, 40s or even 50s. As one walks the roads and traces one hardly hears the call to Co'n Millie or Ma Elsie, Tantan Fiffie or Compere Edgar that was common during one's boyhood except perhaps from the very senior folk. There is a greater sophistication all around as evidenced in mass media, improved standards of living and the mobility of the population. This book is particularly strong in recounting the establishment of the Baptist Church, which is "native" to the Companies. It also highlights the customs and habits of regular churchgoers. It should be of interest to teachers and pupils, particularly at the upper primary and secondary levels, who should be stimulated to probe the history and sociology of their own districts. Students at Teachers Colleges may be interested to know

that, within the first three years of the institution of the Emergency Training College (now Port of Spain Teachers College), such projects had become part of the Social Studies programme and valuable information had been unearthed touching as many villages, communities and institutions as there were student teachers. Unfortunately, the data that was stored is now lost. The Saga of the Companies must therefore be regarded as a challenge to others to start similar projects, however seemingly uninviting. The first two volumes of the Saga were first published in a Mumbai newspaper in 1987-1988 and 1992, when they proved to be very popular. Thomas Kelton, a lusty young lad, grew up in Kelton Township in southwest Scotland. When he was eighteen, he served in the Scots Army fighting Cromwell's English at the battle of Dunbar. He was taken prisoner there, and "sold" and sent to Massachusetts as an indentured servant to serve out a seven year sentence. Oddr Snorrason, a Benedictine monk in northern Iceland in the late twelfth century, composed a landmark Latin biography of the legendary Norwegian king Olaf Tryggvason (died 1000 C.E.). This biography was soon translated into Icelandic, and the translation (though not the Latin original) is preserved in two somewhat differing versions and a small fragment of a third. *The Saga of Olaf Tryggvason* is the first English translation of this text, augmented by an introduction and notes to guide the reader. There is a strong possibility that Oddr's biography was the first full-length saga of the Icelandic Middle Ages. It ushered in a century of saga writing that assured Iceland a unique place in medieval literature and in the history of prose writing. Aside from being a harbinger of the saga tradition, and indeed of the modern novel, *The Saga of Olaf Tryggvason* has its own literary merits, including an epic description of the great Battle of Svoldr, in which King Olaf succumbed. In significant ways the narrative of this battle anticipates the mature style of the classical sagas in the thirteenth century. Five years after attacking the human-

The Old Icelandic text *The Saga of Þórður kakali* survives today as part of the fourteenth-century compilation *The Saga of the Sturlungar*. In extant form, *The Saga of Þórður kakali* is a biography of Þórður kakali Sighvatsson (c.1210-56) - chieftain, royal retainer, and sheriff - and covers the periods 1242-50 and 1254-56, providing an interesting view of power politics and political culture from the periphery of medieval Europe, challenging dominant historiographical narratives derived from the sources produced at the center. Hitherto, only one English translation of *The Saga of the Sturlungar* (and thus *The Saga of Þórður kakali*) has ever been produced. This translation was carried out by Julia McGrew and R. George Thomas (published in two volumes, 1970-74). Nevertheless, even with the invaluable assistance of the eminent Icelandic scholar Sigurður Nordal - who provided English translations of the trickier passages of text - McGrew and Thomas's translation turned out to be "defective and unreliable" (in the words of Oren Falk). Published translations are cultural levelers insofar as they open up texts to broader audiences - members of the interested wider public - who may not have the means or time to learn the original language merely to study a single primary source or read a lone literary classic. While McGrew and Thomas's translation of *The Saga of Þórður kakali* is more or less serviceable if used with extreme caution (i.e., by native English speakers with fluency in Icelandic), the importance of competent translations should not be forgotten, especially for the reader without Icelandic language skills: poor translations can offend, confuse, and mislead users of the target language. The present edition of *The Saga of Þórður kakali* offers a new and accessible translation of the text by D.M. White, produced directly from the Icelandic with which it is printed side by side. D.M. White (b. 1994) received his BA and MA from the University of Birmingham before starting his PhD in the Department of Scandinavian Studies at University College London in 2017. His PhD thesis is on the origins of *The Saga of Þórður kakali*, and is the first attempt to provide a comprehensive picture of this thirteenth-century Icelandic saga's beginnings.
