This book shows that hostility between East and West is neither historical nor inevitable, but rather the result of selective memory. Continuing the comparative survey of pre-industrial family formation undertaken in *The Development of Family and Marriage in Europe* (1983), Professor Goody looks in depth at kinship practice in Asia. Seattle embraced the idea of cosmopolitanism and boosted its role as a cultural and commercial "Gateway to the Orient" at the same time as it limited the ways in which Asian Americans could participate in the public schools, local art production, civic celebrations, and sports.
